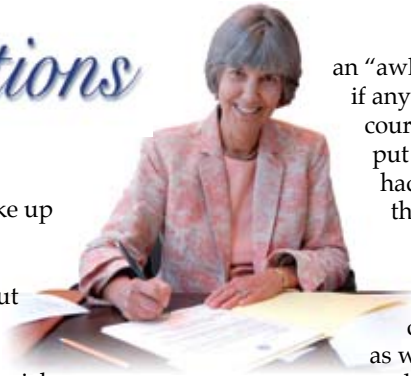

Reflections

Each day I wake up knowing I am going to learn something more about children, teaching, or even life. One of the best parts of my job is that every event at Palm Beach Day Academy brings another opportunity for me to learn and this year's Field Day was no exception. Early last week, I was asked by a prospective parent about our "character education" program. I explained that we didn't call it character education, but on the Lower Campus we have our Lifeskills Program and on our Upper Campus we have our Human, Growth, and Development program. I felt my answer was a little shallow because I know the strength of character that our students have when they leave us. These programs are extremely important to develop vocabulary and set expectations, but clearly we do more than that.

This sent my mind wandering about the building of character and how it relates to Palm Beach Day Academy. I know it happens here daily in many ways and in many forms. I looked up the word "character" and found that it had many definitions. As I scanned the many definitions, it was obvious that the one that is pertinent to us as educators and parents is that of moral character. This is defined as the possession of certain attributes such as integrity, courage, honesty, loyalty, and kindness; all qualities that we try to instill in our students in everything we do in the classroom, on the playgrounds, and pertinent to the Field Day experience, on the field.

On Saturday, as I was moving from event to event, watching our students, and having conversations with them, I was struck by the character that our students exhibited in so many ways. One student stepped up and offered to be goalie not because she wanted to be one but because she sensed

an "awkward silence" when asked if anyone would do it. That takes courage. I watched our students put every ounce of energy they had into competing against their friends and then end with a genuine shaking of hands and hugging. That takes a deep respect and caring for your teammates as well as your opponents. I watched students surround a student who had clearly not done as well as she expected. This takes compassion as well as a willingness to let others support and help you. A lesson that builds character for everyone. And I had a student approach me at the end and thank me for her last field day. That takes thoughtfulness.

I had an alumnus approach me and comment on the warmth and friendliness with which he and his family had been received. As he walked away, I realized that schools have character also. The character of a school is the way in which each individual's character is brought together on behalf of our purpose; the children. And indeed we are a school in which everyone works together with a common purpose. The sum is greater than the parts. Our Family Barbeque and Field Day would not have been possible without the leadership of the coaches, the organization of our Parent School Council, our Student Council and their advisor, and our faculty and staff that pitched in to serve the barbeque on Friday night and to keep us nourished and hydrated throughout the day on Saturday.

As the alumnus walked away, it struck me that he too was part of the PBDA culture in which one steps up and expresses gratitude. I thought of the large number of loyal alumni who joined us that day to share memories and be part of the festivities. They shared stories about teachers who set expectations that they thought were beyond their reach only to find out that they could do more than they thought. And they told me about how well prepared they were to work hard in the next chapters of their lives because of what they'd learned at PBDA. They felt they could face any obstacle.

When I got home, I looked up the word "alumni" and to my surprise it comes from the word "alere" that means to nourish. Indeed our alumni had the character to return and be part of our nourishing and building the character of the next generation.

8TH GRADERS - THINKING AS SCIENTISTS THINK

The lab is filled with the normal murmur of adolescent voices - some discussing the procedure, others arriving at a consensus about the last question in the manual, while others are

discussing their weekend plans, when from across the lab there is a loud pop and the screams of surprise and excitement. "Cool!" "Mr. Wagener, can we do it again?" But before I can respond there's another "pop" followed by

the same howls of excitement. Suddenly, all attention is focused on the inverted test tubes at each lab station. Now, with excited anticipation, lab partners bring the burning matches closer and closer until they reach the open ends of the test tubes, rewarding the 8th Graders with the small flashes and the attention-getting "pops."

Science is a process - a process of discovery, a process of asking questions, formulating hypotheses, and testing those ideas. To find the answers to scientific questions, scientists use an organized set of procedures typically referred to as the "scientific method." Often described as a tidy, step-by-step process, the scientific method is in reality not so linear. Procedures are refined as data are collected and initial hypotheses modified or replaced in light of new evidence. The challenge

in developing a middle school hands-on chemistry course is to get students from point A to point B in the same way the real scientists make that journey - by thinking things through.



The program I have adapted over many years provides the students with many opportunities to experience their own moments of discovery. Through lab activities, the 8th Graders are

exposed to observable phenomena caused by the nature of matter, its structure and behavior. The goal is to have students ponder what they observe as they build a working Particle Model for Matter that will remain in their heads and shape their thinking about the natural world for a lifetime.

During their journey, students are introduced to the tools and equipment of the laboratory. With just enough guidance, they determine which equipment is needed. Problem solving becomes instinctual. The procedures of experimentation are introduced, repeatedly performed, and mastered. Eventually, processes

like generating a gas, collecting it by displacement, and operationally defining it are routine. Tasks, such as massing 1 gram of a substance, to preparing a 50°C hot water bath are commonplace.

The pre-chemistry program aims primarily to give students a valid understanding of the nature of science, and of the way that knowledge in science is accumulated - even when the particles studied are too small to be seen and even when understanding them requires abstract thinking.

The 8th Grade science program prepares our students for future science courses, specifically, high school chemistry. There have been more than a few testimonials from alumni over the years, expressing that what they experienced and learned in their 8th Grade pre-chemistry course gave them solid foundations and a confidence that wasn't shared by many of their new classmates. When they entered their high school chemistry lab, they were not intimidated. They were thoroughly familiar



with the periodic table as a useful scientific tool. They could use it to generate chemical formulas. They were equipped with a working knowledge of the basic types of chemical reactions. They could confidently predict products of reactions and balance equations.

In short, they knew what they were doing, and I'm proud of that - proud of them and proud of our program.
